Raise funds for primary education: Task Force report 'Co-operation' in syllabus

'Govt should lift ban on teachers' recruitment'

Bangalore, July 20: The interim report submitted by the Task Force on Education to Chief Minister S M Krishna on Thursday has asked the State Government to lift the ban on recruitment of primary school teachers.

"To ensure that all children of school going age are enrolled, the Government should issúe immediate orders relaxing this ban pending the decision on rural weightage." the report presented by Dr Raja Ramanna. Chairman of the Task Force, said.

The task force, which visited schools in Raichur district before finalising the interim report, has laid thrust on the importance of providing mini-

mum infrastructure facilities in schools, including separate toilets for girls and boys and drinking water facility.

"Lack of exclusive toilets for girls is a deterrent to girls enrollment and participation. Only 18 per cent of schools have girls toilets and 64 per cent schools have drinking water facility." the report noted.

The mid-day meal scheme

should be extended to all the districts. The mid-day meals should be made available through Gram Panchavats or NGOs.

Primary teacher training courses should be strengthened and regular refresher training for teachers should be held as an integral part of primary education.

Bangalore. July **20**: The State Government will introduce 'Co-operation' as a subiect at the primary level from the next academic year, Co-operation Minister D K Shivkumar said here on Thursday.

He told mediapersons that the Education Department had agreed in principle to the proposal.

The Minister said he had also made the recommendation at a recent meeting held in New Delhi to finalise the draft National Policy on Co-operati-

"The success of any Co-operative is based on the participation of its members and lack of participation has resulted in the sorry state of affairs of

the Co-operative Movement. Hence, the National Policy on Co-operatives should aim at inculcating the sense of co-operation in the vounger generation," he said.

Replying to a query as to whether the subject would be difficult for students at the primary level, the Minister replied: "At a time when, primary students are learning Computer Science and related subjects. I don't think it will be difficult for them".

A deposit insurance scheme should be evolved and deposits up to Rs 1 lakh should be insured on payment of a nominal amount of premium. An Insurance Co-operative should be established to take up insurance activities in the Co-operative sector, he said.

About 15,000 existing vacancies of teachers should be filled and an additional 9,000 recruited. Dr Ramanna said.
